

Welcome to the December 2019 edition of Look East.



Christmas is my favourite time of the year. Whether it's decorating the Christmas tree with my family, or watching my children count down the days on their advent calendars, there is something magical about the festive season.

Christmas in our City is about celebration and coming together with family, friends and the community. This year, the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters is again holding a number of events and attractions that capture this spirit of Christmas.

The festivities began on Saturday
23 November with the popular *Norwood Christmas Pageant*, which many local groups take part in each year. Nearly
20,000 citizens and visitors of different cultures and backgrounds lined the streets to cheer more than 75 floats, bands and marching groups as they walked, sang and danced their way from Norwood Oval to Queen Street.

Twilight Carols took place on Friday 6 December in the beautiful outdoor setting of Linde Reserve, Stepney. I encourage you to pack a picnic dinner and head to the next event—an open-air movie on Norwood Oval on Saturday 14 December.

For those who love lights and decorations, The Parade has again been adorned with Christmas trees and lights, this year complemented by a red star in front of the Norwood Town Hall.

The Library Holiday Program also offers a range of different activities and events that cater for children of all ages over the summer break—but be sure to book early to make sure you don't miss out!

I'd also like to thank every child who put their creative talents to work and designed a Christmas card for this year's Mayor's Christmas Card Competition. A big congratulations to this year's winner, Harper Hamdorf, whose drawing appears on the front cover of this edition of *Look East*.

The festive season is also a time to reflect on the past 12 months. By any measure 2019 has been a challenging year for the Council and Local Government generally.

Legislative reforms to Local Government, proposed changes to the Planning system and the upheaval of the waste management sector, has created a challenging environment for the Council to address these issues and understand their impacts on our community.

Of particular note are the changes to the State's heritage system, where the Council has expressed concerns regarding the weakening of demolition controls affecting Contributory Items—historical dwellings that contribute to the City's overall character and sense-of-place.


A recent survey of the 1,463 owners of Contributory Items in our City showed that out of the 397 respondents, 82% think that demolition controls for these properties, which are located within Historic Conservation Zones, should be strengthened.

The Council has, and will continue to argue strongly to Parliament, the State Planning Commission and the State Government about the importance of ensuring our built heritage is protected and preserved for future generations.

On behalf of my wife Pina and our children Isabella, Christian and Charlotte, I extend my best wishes to you for a holy and joyous Christmas, and safe and prosperous New Year.



"We both really enjoyed working on this project together and John was incredibly resourceful in using old household furnishings to rebuild the pirate ship," adds Wendy.

With an impressive new pirate ship float complete with a treasure chest,

John and Wendy always look forward to seeing the delight on faces of children lining The Parade for the Norwood Christmas Pageant.


A total of 223 entries were received from children at 16 schools, all of an exceptionally high standard.

This year has been an interesting one, particularly for Torrens Ward residents. The Felixstow Reserve development was completed and opened to the community in February and has since received recognition at the State AILA Awards in the categories of Parks and Open Space; Cultural Heritage Award of Excellence; and Healthy Parks, Healthy People. It has also been successful at a National level at the 2019 AILA Landscape Architecture Awards in the 'Parks and Open Space' category. Receiving these prestigious awards is an honour for our City. The project team are to be congratulated.

The River Torrens Linear Park Shared Path upgrade is completed, being enjoyed by many utilising this facility. The Drage Reserve (Felixstow) Playground Upgrade has been completed, making it a more accessible and inclusive area. The installation of traffic signals and associated works at the intersection of OG Road and Turner Street is finally happening with work in progress. Solutions to the ongoing traffic management problems in River and Beasley Streets at the intersection of Lower Portrush Road, are still being negotiated with hope of resolution in the near future.

The State Government has drafted a new Planning and Design Code, coming into effect on 1 July 2020, which appears to show an apparent lack of respect for heritage. This Council will continue to protect its heritage and history.

Parking problems remain difficult to resolve, especially when commuters park all day and there is regular vehicle congestion around schools. The Council is working to update its parking policy with a view to alleviating these issues as far as possible.

Another major issue this year has been the radical rewriting of our planning system by State bureaucrats. Council staff and concerned Councillors are working hard to try to protect the Historic Conservation Zones and Character Zones before the State Government's feared Planning and Design Code comes into force from 1 July 2020. However many safeguards to ensure good quality development will be tossed aside by the Code which will also allow developers to hire private planning certifiers to approve their development proposals. This raises conflict of interest issues. The public interest in development is to be seriously undermined. To find about the Code, visit the SA Planning Portal. Submissions can be made until 28 February 2020. We need an avalanche of submissions from residents to combat the power of the developer lobby.

Thank you to our staff, Volunteers, carers, residents' groups and community organisations for their dedication and hard work this year.

As a result of community concerns, the Council is initiating a footpath sweeping program for those streets with Queensland Box trees; the planting of an additional 300 different species of trees over three years; the increased maintenance of footpaths; a review of street sweeping; a 15 year storm water program to manage flash flooding; and a whole-of-Council parking review. The Parade Masterplan is progressing as planned, and we will have wider footpaths, a scramble crossing at The Parade and George Street intersection, and additional landscaping. The Council is developing Kent Town Urban Design and Economic Growth plans to deliver a pleasant, vibrant and culturally rich suburb.

The greatest current concern for the Council and our community is the State Government's proposed Development Plan reforms. I consider them an outrageous assault on the heritage and history of our Council and State. The Council has spent 40 years developing robust policies and plans to protect our City's character, only to be undermined by short sighted proposals from State Government that facilitate the destruction of attractive streetscapes and historic buildings. Who can blame people across the State for feeling frustrated and helpless? I suspect that many politicians don't understand the strength of community concern. Our State should be immensely proud of its heritage, as expressed in the built form of our historic towns and neighbourhoods, and politicians should be protecting it, not destroying it.

On a happier note, a special thank you to all the Council Volunteers, and a Merry Christmas to everyone. Take time to enjoy the Pageant, the outdoor concerts in the parks, and the Festive Gallery on Osmond, made by local school children.

Community Survey

Commissioned by the Council, the Community Survey is an important initiative which assists the Council to monitor and improve its performance and reinforces the Council's commitment to improving the Community's Well-being.

It is also an opportunity for the Council to measure and report on its progress towards achieving the objectives of the long-term strategic plan, CityPlan 2030: Shaping Our Future.

The survey was previously undertaken in 2017, 2013, 2011 and 2009; results from which provide strong foundations for benchmarking the various performance indicators and results.

The survey was carried out by an independent organisation between May and July 2019. A total of 401 face-to-face surveys were undertaken with residents, and 203 telephone and online surveys were undertaken with business owners/operators. All participants in the survey were randomly selected.



The Council's performance has remained relatively consistent compared to the 2017 Community Survey results.

Overall, the Council's performance has remained relatively consistent compared to the 2017 Community Survey results, with some areas improving and others requiring further attention.



Top three industry types







Upgrading the **River Torrens** Linear Park path

The River Torrens Linear Park is one of Adelaide's most Stretching almost 47 kilometres from the hills to the coast. the park is a popular spot for walking, running and cycling.

In our City, the River Torrens Linear Park extends from Felixstow Reserve to Hackney. In 2017, the Council joined eight other councils to identify what could be done to make the park even more enjoyable for all users.

In August 2019, the Council enhanced the 2.59 kilometres stretch of path that extends from Felixstow Reserve to Ninth Avenue and Battams Road, St Peters. The pathway is now more appealing for all visitors to the park and features:

- A widened footpath with a new width of between 3 and 3.5 metres.
- New lighting making it safer to visit the park in the evening and early morning.
- Line marking to help ensure traffic on either side of the path moves in the same direction.

The path has been aligned around a number of large gum trees, so that they can be preserved and enjoyed by generations to come. The project was funded by the Australian Government as part of the Roads to Recovery Program.

Using a shared path:

- Use the shared path like you would a road-stick to the left and overtake on the right.
- If you're walking a dog, keep them on a short leash on the path. Dogs must be kept on a leash on all parts of the River Torrens Linear Park path in the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters. If you'd like to let your dog off-leash, you can visit one of our ten off-leash parks or reserves.
- If you're cycling, don't go too fast and keep a safe distance between yourself and any pedestrians you encounter, especially children and animals. Make sure your bike has a bell so you can alert others that you're coming.





Have your say on new planning rules

The State Government is changing planning rules in South Australia. There will no longer be individual Council Development Plans, but a state-wide Planning and Design Code. This will impact the way development occurs in your suburb.

These new planning rules and the new laws will come into full effect across South Australia on 1 July 2020. The draft Planning and Design Code is currently out for consultation. The community is encouraged to find out how these changes will impact them.

The Council is continuing to make representations to the State Planning Commission about the Code policies on issues such as heritage and character protection, appropriate land use mix and intensity, height and scale of new development, floodplain protection and environmental requirements for new development.

Jewel in our crown

The redevelopment of Felixstow Reserve has risen to national fame, winning a multitude of prestigious awards since its grand unveiling in February.

Amongst its many accolades is the highest honour in the Parks and Open Space Category, which the project received at the esteemed Australian Institute of Landscape Architecture National Awards held in Melbourne on 10 October.

The Felixstow Reserve Redevelopment Project was praised for demonstrating, "Best practice in contemporary design, incorporating considerations of site, water, community engagement and facilities," as well as for its approach to cross-cultural engagement and collaboration.

Key features of the reserve include a pavilion, fitness stations, BBQ areas, drinking fountains, basketball, netball and bocce courts, a nature play area, and cultural art trail. It is also home to an expansive wetland which collects,

treats and stores stormwater to be used for irrigation across the eastern region of Adelaide.

"Felixstow Reserve has been highly praised for good reason. Feedback from the community on the redevelopment has been overwhelmingly positive and it's wonderful to see so many people using it as a place to relax, exercise, connect with nature and learn about the Kaurna cultural heritage of our area," says Mayor Robert Bria.

The redevelopment project outshone 12 nominees from across the country to take out the top prize, including one from Queensland, two from both New South Wales and Tasmania, three from Victoria and Western Australia, and another South Australian project.

"The old playground had reached its end of life, but rather than replacing it with similar equipment, the Council saw an opportunity to create a more inclusive playground that offers a variety of play experiences for children of all abilities," says Mayor Robert Bria.

The new playground area also features a rubber base, making it accessible and safe for all children.

"Thanks to the generosity of the Count Me In Foundation the playground is now home to a wheelchair-friendly trampoline which has been a welcome addition for families."

The Council has been overwhelmed with positive feedback about the new play equipment, which complements the nearby nature play area in Felixstow Reserve.

The first stage of the redevelopment, which was completed in September, also included a renewed car park and new toilet facilities.

Further works are scheduled to commence during summer and will include more accessible entry points to the playground area, seating, barbecue facilities and drinking fountain, landscaping and irrigation.

Luca's leading the war against waste in our community

Local primary school student, Luca, has been passionate about recycling since he was three years old. We spoke to his mum, Rachel, about how Luca, now aged ten, is not only leading his school, but also his community, in the war against waste.

How has Luca changed how you dispose of waste at home?

We've purchased different bins for recyclables, compost, 10 cent bottles and landfill. This allows us to sort our rubbish thoroughly, making recycling much easier.

Luca has also taught us to wash plastic and recyclable items and make sure they go in the recycling bin, instead of sending them to landfill.

How has Luca inspired the community to avoid, reduce, reuse, recycle or compost waste?

Luca is well known in his community for his enthusiasm about recycling. He runs a bin cleaning service for neighbours and friends, and he will bring their bins in and take them out on collection day. He also contacts East Waste for people if their bin needs fixing.

At school, he's started a recycling program, which has included providing OSHC with a compost bin and delivering presentations to educate his classmates on which rubbish goes in which bin.

It sounds like Luca is incredibly passionate about recycling—why does he believe it's so important?

Luca believes avoiding, reducing, reusing, recycling and composting waste is really important, as less waste goes to landfill. This means less carbon monoxide is released into the environment which helps reduce global warming, leaving a clean and healthy environment for us and future generations.

What does Luca want to be when he grows up?

When he grows up, Luca would love to work for KESAB or East Waste, where he can educate people about which rubbish goes in which bin. The teachers at Luca's school and OSHC think he will be a minister for the environment!

What are Luca's tips on making it easier for people to recycle their waste?

His top tip would be to have different bins for different waste, so it can be easily sorted and is less likely to get mixed up. Using a kitchen caddy has made composting food really easy—we just empty it into the green bin when it's full!



Reducing the impact of waste in our City is central to our commitment to be a leader in environmental sustainability and act on climate change.

Just like Luca, you can reduce the amount of waste you send to landfill and it may be easier than you think!

You can recycle many things through the kerbside collection, such as hard plastics, glass, metal and paper in the yellow bin and send food and garden waste to be composted in the green bin.

You can pick these up at the Norwood Town Hall, any of the Council's libraries or you can book a delivery online. To use your kitchen caddy, fill it with food scraps such as peel, egg shells and tea bags. Once it's full, empty it into the green bin. It will be taken away and made into nutrient rich compost.

- Completed a section of the River Torrens Linear Park Shared Pathway Project, making it safer for cyclists and pedestrians.

Our Challenges

- The Council conducted a grants program to assist residents to maintain regulated and significant trees on private property.
 Unfortunately this was unsuccessful due to a low number of applications.
- Maintaining an open pathway for cyclists and pedestrians throughout the completion of the River Torrens Linear Park pathway enhancement project.






Year in Review

Financial Summary

Achieving and maintaining financial sustainability is a key ongoing objective for the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters. In 2018–2019, the Council continued to work towards this objective, achieving a better than expected Operating Surplus of \$2.380 million.

Operating Result

In 2018–2019, the Council reported an Operating Surplus of \$2.380 million, compared to a budgeted Operating Surplus of \$1.430 million.

Achieving and maintaining financial sustainability is a key objective of the Council. The Council continues to deliver an underlying Operating Surplus in line with its financial outcomes, which are set out in the Council's long-term Financial Plan.

Income & Expenditure

Income


Council rates are a form of property taxation and are the main source of funding for the activities undertaken by the Council. In the 2018–2019 financial year, rates represented 75.1% of total income (compared with 74.8% in 2017–2018).

In 2018–2019, the Council collected \$33.567 million in rate revenue, comprising of:

- General Rate Revenue* \$33.357 million; and
- Parade Separate Rate* \$0.209 million.


The Council supplements rate revenue with grants and user fees in order to provide services, facilities and projects for the community. Some of the services provided are required to be delivered by the Council under the *Local Government Act* 1999, while others services and programs are delivered to meet community needs or to deliver on community expectations.

Income from all sources to fund the Council's services and programs is \$44.7 million (a 2.1% increase from 2017–2018).

Expenditure

During 2018–2019, the Council spent \$40.088 million to deliver its continuing services, with a further \$963,000 to provide special events and programs or for the introduction of new services, initiatives and programs. The Council also collected \$1.280 million on behalf of the State Government for its Natural Resource Management Levy.

Initiatives included events such as Concerts in the Park, Tour Down Under and the Adelaide International Youth Film Festival. Statutory and service reviews included the Dog & Cat Management Plan, Civil Asset Condition Review and Local Government elections. Environmental initiatives included the Council's City-Wide Flood Review, climate adaptation projects through the Resilient East partnership and the planting of additional street trees.
