



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Mayor's Message

Welcome to the Winter 2022 edition of Look East



It's hard to recall a more exciting time for our City.

The first half of this year has been a busy time, with the Council working hard to lay the foundations for the future of our community.

There are already a number of major projects underway and several others that will commence in the coming months.

These include the \$4.5 million reconstruction of St Peters Street and the redevelopment of Burchell Reserve, St Peters and Borthwick Park at Kensington.

The Council also continues to provide much-needed support to local businesses to help them keep their doors open and generate local job opportunities. To find out more about this support assistance please refer to pages 8 to 11.

On the policy front, the Council's first ever City-wide Tree Strategy has been recently adopted, which provides a clear pathway in terms of increasing the tree canopy coverage in our City.

A Built Heritage Strategy and Action Plan is also being developed by the Council in response to growing community concern about the loss of unprotected heritage buildings.

The Council's events calendar also promises to be one of the best ever, starting with Raising the Bar Adelaide in August.

For music lovers, the inaugural Springfest festival in October will see some of Australia's best musical artists play at the Norwood Concert Hall.

And, after a two year break, the iconic Norwood Christmas Pageant is set to return to The Parade, bringing joy and entertainment to thousands of locals and visitors hoping to capture some Christmas magic.

Amongst all this activity, the Council has developed its budget with a focus on striking the right balance between modest rate increases and continuing to deliver services and infrastructure.

The centrepiece of this year's \$51.3 million investment in Capital Projects and Infrastructure is the \$22 million redevelopment of the Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre. To find out more refer to page 6.

Other key projects include \$10 million for drainage works to prevent flooding and \$2.7 million to upgrade shared path ways for pedestrians and cyclists along the River Torrens Linear Park, as well as \$2 million for The Parade Masterplan.

These projects have been planned for some time and have undergone extensive consultation. It's now time for the Council to deliver these projects for our community.

Finally, with the 2022 Local Government elections in November, I strongly encourage you all to ensure you are registered to participate in the democratic process. The election is your opportunity to have your voice heard about the local issues that matter to you.

I hope you enjoy the Winter edition of Look East.

Protecting residents and businesses from flooding

Major funding boost to the Council's stormwater infrastructure

Residents, businesses and property owners will benefit from a \$9.9 million Federal Government grant to upgrade and improve stormwater infrastructure.

This significant investment is being matched dollar-for-dollar by the Council, resulting in a near \$20 million investment to reduce the risk of flooding in St Morris, Trinity Gardens, Maylands and Stepney.

The funding is from the Federal Government's Preparing Australia Program, which targets local projects across the nation, with a focus on improving resilience against natural disasters.

The new infrastructure will assist in reducing surface flood waters during storm events by capturing stormwater and temporarily storing it in a proposed detention basin and underground detention tanks located within the road network.

Importantly, the funding boost will offset the Council's overall \$38.4 million investment to protect residents and businesses from flooding at various locations in our City.

As part of its Flood Mitigation Assessment, the Council has allocated funding to upgrade stormwater infrastructure, particularly to prevent the damaging consequences of a one in 100-year rainfall event.

The City's stormwater drainage network is one of many infrastructure assets which is provided and maintained by the Council for the community.

The City-wide upgrades to the stormwater drainage network stems from a floodplain mapping project which identified locations which are at risk from flooding and considers a range of future scenarios, including infill development and the ongoing impacts of climate change. Work on the project is expected to start at the end of the year.

Nino Solari Commemorative Path

Cycling champion honored

Undoubtedly one of the most revered figures in South Australia's cycling history, Nino Solari was a very familiar face in our City.

And although he was considered to be one of the greatest Australian cyclists and a legend of the sport, Nino was more than just an elite athlete.

His love of cycling and his passion to share his knowledge, helped to turn young sports people into exceptional athletes, even helping to launch world-class cycling careers.

In May this year, a commemorative path honoring the achievements of the cycling champion—and his long lasting legacy—was officially opened by Mayor Robert Bria and Mr Solari's family.

The Commemorative Path on Osmond Terrace is part of the Beulah Road Bicycle Boulevard Project.

The structure includes interpretive signage, display boards and custom artwork recognising Nino's achievements and contributions to the sport of cycling and to community life in our City.

It also includes:

- new pedestrian kerb ramps and wider pedestrian footpaths;
- a dedicated cycling path through the median;
- landscaping, including planting and irrigation within the Osmond Terrace median and at all four corners of the intersection; and
- furniture, including two concrete benches, and a bicycle repair station with bike stand, tools and pump located across the road.

Work on the Nino Solari Commemorative Path commenced this year and was undertaken in consultation with Mr Solari's family. To find out more about the project visit: www.npsp.sa.gov.au



Planting for the future

Council endorses its first ever Tree Strategy

Trees are one of our City's most appealing and valuable environmental features.

Not only are they the lungs of our community, bringing cooler temperatures in summer, they also provide beauty to our streets and habitat for birds and animals to sustain biodiversity.

There are more than 20,000 street trees in the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters and 7,000 trees in parks and reserves.

In an important step to ensure the establishment, protection and longevity of our trees, the Council adopted its first ever Tree Strategy in April.

The purpose of the Tree Strategy is to set out a roadmap and actions required to strategically increase the tree canopy cover in our City. Importantly, the Strategy has set a target of planting 500 new trees each year over the next five years.

While its primary focus is on street trees, the Strategy also identifies opportunities to influence the retention and growth of trees on both public and private land.

Primarily, the Strategy serves as the blueprint to guide the management, forward planning, planting and maintenance of all Council owned trees over the next five years

The Council has committed to increasing its tree coverage by 20 per cent by 2045, with a particular focus on suburbs with low levels of tree coverage.

The Strategy is arranged under five strategic themes which summarise the Council's aspirations.

Identify and Manage – A City where trees are managed as valuable living community assets.

Protect and Value – A City where the existing tree population is valued and retained.

Plan for Growth and Renewal – A greener, cooler and more liveable City with an equitable distribution of trees for present and future generations

Maintain – A beautiful, clean and safe City with healthy and well maintained trees.

Inspire and Influence – A City that recognises the power of collaboration to achieve an increase in the number of trees on private and public land to meet the City's tree canopy targets.

Inspiring growth at a local level

Council and Rotary working together to help the environment

St Peters Rotary Club is leading the way in demonstrating the power of collaboration when it comes to greening the City.

The Club, in partnership with the Council, is offering funding grants to community groups, schools, educational institutions and businesses to assist them to make a positive difference to the environment.

The St Peters Rotary Environmental Grants range from \$50 to \$1000 and will be offered for initiatives and ideas, including but not limited to:

- undertaking a planting day to increase canopy cover;
- providing environmental education to children;
- establishing a native garden to attract bees, birds or butterflies;
- conservation work; and
- waste and recycling systems

The grant round opens after 1 July 2022.

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Community, consultation, construction

The Council has made a commitment to the community to deliver a range of exciting major projects.









These major projects will benefit residents and visitors while improving the City's infrastructure and facilities. These projects will also create jobs during construction and provide an overall boost to our local economy.

Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre

Plans are well underway to transform the Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre into a state-of-the-art water park.

The Council will be investing \$16.5 million next financial year in this project, in addition to \$500,000 being spent this year.

Once completed the Council's investment will be almost \$24 million, which includes a \$5.6 million contribution from the State Government.

The Swimming Centre will feature a new 50-metre pool, undercover 25-metre pool, high platform waterslides, a water play area and ramp access to ensure all members of the community can enjoy the new facilities.

The redeveloped Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre is planned to be open for the 2023–2024 swimming season and we look forward to seeing you then!

Dunstan Adventure Playground

The redevelopment of the Dunstan Adventure Playground will commence in October this year—following extensive consultation with a wide range of sectors in the community, including children and the Traditional Owners of the Land.

The upgrade includes new equipment, including an adventure themed playground, a new slide, plus much more.

Burchell Reserve

The transformation of Burchell Reserve is scheduled to be completed by the middle of 2023.


The Council's \$2.6 million investment will deliver state-of-the art facilities with multi-purpose courts: two community tennis courts, basketball and netball rings, shelter, barbeque and picnic facilities, new play equipment, furniture, lighting, toilets and more.

St Peters Street Upgrade

Construction of St Peters Street is expected to be completed early next year.

The \$4.5 million investment will result in improved safety for pedestrians and cyclists, new trees, landscaping and accessibility to the River Torrens.

Eastside Business Awards

Resilient, inspiring and highly regarded

With a record number of votes cast, the Eastside Business Awards have once again reinforced that the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters has some of the most highly regarded, resilient and creative businesses in SA.

More than 10,900 public votes were cast for 295 businesses across the 11 categories. Mayor Robert Bria said he greatly appreciated the community's ongoing support of the Awards.

"This year we had a record number of votes from the public—up 4000 from previous years," Mayor Bria said.

He also paid tribute to the local business community, recognising the difficult environment they have worked through during the past two years.

"While all three spheres of government stepped up to provide support packages to help local traders keep their doors open and save jobs, the real heroes of the pandemic are the thousands of local businesses in our City," he said.

"Their resilience, persistence and ability to adapt in a dynamic environment with constant changes to density limits and other rules has been inspiring." Mayor Bria said one of the stalwarts of the local business community was James Thredgold who received the prestigious Hall of Fame Award.

The Awards are supported by Solstice Media (the publisher of InDaily, CityMag and SALIFE, as well as AFM services).

There were also two new categories this year—Best Arts & Culture/ Entertainment Experience and Best Professional Service.

The inaugural Best Arts & Culture/ Entertainment Experience award went to the Mary MacKillop Museum, which offers an interactive and hands-on experience to inspire and educate people of all ages.

It was another successful year for Pavé Cafe, which received the highly sought-after Best Café/Restaurant Award, after winning Best Coffee two years in a row.

It is also the fifth award for Little Bang Brewing after it was awarded Best Entertainment Venue last year and Best Pub/Bar for the three previous years.

Hall of Fame winner — James Thredgold Jeweller

Creating bespoke designs while relishing in a dynamic yet traditional industry, being a jeweller is an incredible profession.

That is the sentiment of James
Thredgold whose career has enabled
him to travel all over the world, building
strong friendships along the way.

"When it comes to design, there are always national and international trends, but I am not bound by those," James says.

"I may see something inspiring in a piece of architecture. I once did a design based on the Chrysler Building (in Manhattan).

"But most of the time, I let the gem stones guide me and tell me what it needs to be."

"Over the last four to five years, our big coloured semi-precious stones have been highly sought after."

"When Big proposed to Carrie in Sex and the City (the hugely popular television series) with a 5 carat black diamond engagement ring, it became very, very popular."

James employs 11 staff—including Head Jeweller Derek Gregory. They have worked side by side for 24 years, with James joking that he spends more time with Derek than Derek's wife does.

When asked how it felt to be crowned the 2022 Hall of Fame winner, James said:

"It was just amazing. There are multiple local businesses that are more than 20 years old so I was never expecting to win. I have had so many texts and emails to say congratulations."

"The Awards bring attention to a range of retailers who would traditionally go without being acknowledged, especially during tough times such as COVID."

"Whether it's first, second, third or fourth, the Eastside Business Awards make businesses feel incredibly worthwhile. It is great that the Council organises the event each year." "I also just love the diversity of The Parade. There is such an organic mix of people." he said.

James, who is a qualified manufacturing jeweller after undertaking a four-year apprenticeship, specialises in hand-crafted designs—one of only a handful of jewellers in Adelaide to do so.

His business, which has been located on The Parade for 25 years, also boasts an exclusive range of Tag Heuer, Bremont, Garmin, Gucci and Roberto Coin.

Throughout the eight-week competition, 5216 entries were received, with analysis determining there was direct expenditure of more than \$514,000 at 196 different businesses within The Parade Precinct. The competition was drawn on 13 April.

The competition was an initiative of the Council's Norwood Parade Precinct Committee, in partnership with Solitaire Automotive Group. The requirements included a minimum of \$25 to be spent at a participating business within The Parade Precinct, and then submitting an online entry.

JOLT into gear in NPSP

The Council has partnered with two electric vehicle charging companies, JOLT and Evie Networks to install public electric vehicle charging stations at various locations across the City.

The Council is leading the way to support the take up of electric vehicles, giving owners and potential purchasers of electric vehicles confidence in the availability and convenience of charging infrastructure.

Electric vehicles (EVs) create less air and noise pollution, and when powered by renewable energy, eliminate climate altering greenhouse gases. With the rising cost of fuel, the Council is pleased to be supporting innovations which reduce the cost of transportation and benefit the environment.

Initially there will be six publicly accessible fast charging stations, located in carparks or on the road, installed from July this year. Some stations will be paired with an electronic billboard which will feature upcoming Council events and services.

Motorists will be able to charge vehicles in as little as 10 minutes with enough range to travel a distance of about 50km.

All energy will be drawn from renewable sources.

Increasing the availability of charging infrastructure is a key piece of the puzzle for widespread adoption of EVs and the Council is very excited to be partnering with JOLT and Evie Networks.

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Community Survey

The biennial Community Survey was undertaken in late 2021, with face-to-face interviews and online consultation with more than 800 residents and business operators in our City.


Participants were asked to rate their satisfaction on a scale of one (the lowest) to five (the highest). At the end of the survey, participants were able to provide a suggestion or comment to assist the Council in improving its service delivery. The Community Survey asks how satisfied people are with the various services, programs and facilities the Council provides, together with other questions that affect overall quality of life in the City.

Changes in satisfaction levels are monitored to help identify areas where the Council can improve performance to meet the community's expectations. All participants in the survey were randomly selected.







The Business Survey results show an increase in the Council's performance in the following areas:




Significant increases can be seen in three of the above performance areas; leadership, economic development and quality of life.



Car parking is a difficult issue to resolve as our residents and businesses often have competing expectations. Seeking to strike a balance, the Council is currently investigating options for providing additional car parking at the Webbe Street car park in Norwood, while implementing a City-wide car parking policy to alleviate business and resident concerns with long-term commuter parking in residential streets.

Summary

The Council takes your comments seriously to help improve its services and performance to the community.

In 2022–2023, the Council proposes to:

- progress The Parade and George Street upgrades, which will significantly improve the infrastructure and appearance of these prime areas;
- allocate \$29.75 million to improving infrastructure across the City, including road, footpath, kerb and guttering improvements, street lighting and stormwater upgrades;
- allocate \$4.5 million on waste and recycling services;
- allocate \$1.36 million on managing street trees; and
- allocate \$995,000 towards economic development initiatives for businesses across the City.

"While people may have a specific interest like I did with book repair, it pays to be open to other opportunities.

"It really interests me to hear stories of other Volunteers and what they are involved in as well as the stories of the people to whom I deliver books."

Glenys says an additional chapter of her volunteering may include environmental sustainability projects.
