As I walked in the Pageant with two of my children and saw so many smiling and happy faces, I felt inspired and proud of the strength and vitality of our community and the willingness of so many local groups, schools and organisations to make this iconic event a success.

Events such as the Pageant serve as a reminder of how fortunate we are to live, work and play in such a great place, where people get involved, lend a hand to others and contribute to our sense of community.

In these difficult and uncertain economic times, these values take on greater importance to ensure those who are experiencing hardship and isolation during the festive season are not forgotten.

As 2015 draws to a close, we can reflect on what has been a year of achievement, opportunity and challenge for our City.

This time last year, I said that my number one priority as Mayor in this term was to work with the new Council to ensure our City stayed on the path of financial sustainability.

In 2014-2015, the Council recorded the lowest average residential rate increase (1.4%) of any council in the metropolitan area, as well as an operating surplus of \$3.863 million.

This was no doubt a pleasing result but it also presents the challenge to continue to keep spending in check, to help ensure similar rate increases and healthy budget surpluses in the future.

The next 12 months will see the start of many major projects, such as the Felixstow Reserve wetland, Norwood Football Club Member's facility, The Parade Masterplan and Beulah Road Bikeway Project.

The Council will also undertake its quadrennial review of *CityPlan 2030* and will engage the community to determine whether our priorities and objectives are still relevant.

In closing, I would like to thank my fellow Elected Members for their service to our community over the past year. I would also like to thank the Council's Chief Executive Officer, Mario Barone, and his Executive Leadership team and all Council staff for their energy and professionalism.

No community can flourish without Volunteers. To this end, I would sincerely like to thank the 234 Council-registered Volunteers who continue to dedicate their time, skills and knowledge to help make our community a better place to live, work and play.

On behalf of my wife, Pina, and our children, Isabella, Christian and Charlotte, I wish you all a joyous Christmas, and a safe and prosperous 2016.

Christmas Wreaths Light Up the Norwood Town Hall



In December, the Council partnered with local creative hub, Brick+Mortar, to deliver a festive art installation on The Parade, Norwood, in the form of Christmas wreaths for display in the windows of the Norwood Town Hall until 4 January 2016.

Brick+Mortar, a curated selection of designer stores and artist studios based in Norwood, was commissioned by the Council to engage the work of seven creatives for this unique Christmas project.

Each artist was asked to decorate a Christmas wreath using their preferred medium and provide a short story on their inspiration. The wreaths, created by Estee Austin of Austin Bloom, were embellished with seven different styles, including illustration, typography, ceramics, felt, flora, jewellery and painting.

Founder of Brick+Mortar, Elizabeth Donaldson, said she was thrilled to be approached by the Council and for the opportunity it presented to some of Brick+Mortar's creatives.

"The Council has been a fantastic creative partner for Brick+Mortar this year in assisting us to support creative entrepreneurs and emerging small businesses in the area," said Elizabeth.

"This unique project is a great opportunity to celebrate the festive season by showcasing the work of local artists as part of the Council's festive window display, which offers something unique and a little quirky and different to traditional Christmas decorations, with the focus on supporting local makers and businesses.

The Parade Masterplan



As one of the State's premier Mainstreet, The Parade, Norwood, has experienced a significant increase in popularity over recent years.

In recognition of this, and the fact that it is the economic, cultural and civic heart of the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters, the Council has commenced work on a Masterplan to guide the redevelopment of this significant public realm.

At a Special Council Meeting held on 29 September 2015, the Council endorsed the proposed project framework for the development of The Parade Masterplan.


The Masterplan will encompass the whole of The Parade, Norwood (Fullarton to Portrush Road) and will include all of the key pedestrian, cycle and road networks that connect onto The Parade.

Once completed, the Masterplan will provide the design framework for the future redevelopment of The Parade, to ensure that it is capable of meeting the needs of the local community and the broader community generally, now, and into the future.

The Parade Masterplan will be developed over a number of stages and will incorporate significant engagement and consultation with residents, businesses and visitors, as well as various State Government Departments, to achieve strong community understanding and ownership of the future vision for The Parade. This will include consultation with children from local Schools, as well as initial engagement opportunities at the Council's Tour Down Under events on Thursday 21 and Friday 22 January 2016.

Felixstow Reserve Masterplan



At its meeting held on 7 December 2015, the Council endorsed the Felixstow Reserve Masterplan.

The Felixstow Reserve Masterplan has been developed following three rounds of extensive community engagement and consultation to ensure that the community's aspirations for the Reserve are realised.

Some of the key features incorporated into the Masterplan include a wetland, a large central open space area for informal sport and recreation, as well as the relocation and interpretation of a historically and culturally significant Canoe Scar Tree in order to illustrate the rich cultural history of this area for Aboriginal people.

Also included in the redevelopment will be a network of pedestrian and cycle pathways, BBQ and picnic facilities, new public toilets and car parking, natural play equipment in the lower park area, fitness equipment located throughout the Reserve, a circular running track with distance markers, a games and activity space and a multi-purpose court.

The Felixstow Reserve Masterplan will provide the framework for the redevelopment of this significant open space, in order to enhance and realise the full potential of this regional asset.

The Project will now progress to Detail Design with the redevelopment of the Reserve anticipated to commence in 2016.

New Policy to Boost our City's Live Music Scene



The City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters is destined to become a thriving live music hub under the Council's new Live Music Policy.

At its meeting held on Monday 7 December 2015, the Council unanimously voted to support the adoption of the Live Music Policy, to foster and strengthen the city's live music and performance sector.

Informed by the 2013 SA Live Music Report 'Revive', the Policy has been developed in recognition of the significant contribution that live music can make to the social, cultural and economic fabric of a community.

"Live music is a key feature of our City's major events, festivals and other celebrations, bringing people of diverse backgrounds and cultures together," said Mayor Bria.

"It is for this reason that the Council has an important role to play in supporting the sustainable growth of the local live music sector in our City," he said.

The new Live Music Policy sets out a range of strategies specific to the facilitation and promotion of live music within the City, while considering the interests of all community stakeholders including performers, venue owners, promoters, residents and visitors.

"The Council is committed to working with live music venues and the community to achieve a balance which supports musicians and promotes live music, whilst protecting the interests of our residents."

"Under the new Live Music Policy, the Council will support legislative reform proposals aimed at improving accessibility of live music at licensed venues, while at the same time ensuring appropriate checks and balances are carried out to ensure residential amenity is not unduly impacted," Mayor Bria said.

From directly engaging local musicians in Council-managed events, to providing spaces for live music in open spaces and key streets, the Live Music Policy is the first step in building a healthy, sustainable future for the live music sector towards the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters.

Payneham Oval Playground Opening



The new action-themed all abilities playground at Payneham Oval, opened in August 2015, with a free community event held to celebrate the completion of this regional-level play space.

Offering free entertainment, children's activities, face painting and free food and drinks, the event attracted a crowd of 4,000 avid supporters for the new playground who came from across the Council area and suburbs beyond.

Local resident, Angela Benedetti, attended the opening event with her children and was one of many to contact the Council expressing her appreciation.

"I would like to thank everyone involved in the redevelopment of the playground at Payneham Oval... my children and I love the new area! It was great to see so many families at the official opening event," said Angela.

"We went back there twice in the week since the playground opened and it is great to see the area being used by so many people," she said.

Payneham Oval is the third of five innovative playgrounds planned for key sites within the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters, as part of the Council's Playgrounds Strategy.

St Peters Childcare Centre & Preschool Extension

The planned extension of the St Peters Child Care Centre & Preschool commenced in October 2015 and once completed, will result in a modernised facility featuring six purpose-built learning environments.

The building work at the Centre is anticipated to be completed by the end of 2015, with new enrolments to be accepted from February 2016. The extension will increase the licensed capacity of the Centre to 94 places, an additional 14 long day care places, which effectively creates an additional 70 places each week.


Following the completion of the building works, the redevelopment of the outdoor play space overlooking Dunstone Grove-Linde Reserve will commence, with the aim of providing a more naturalised environment for children to be exposed to different textures and sensory experiences.

In addition to the traditional play elements of swings, slides and a sandpit, the outdoor learning environment will include additional digging patches separated by a dry creek bed and water channel, as well as quiet play areas where children can sit amongst the plants and observe birds and insects.

Resilient East

Climate Change Adaptation Plan




Leading the way in preparing for the challenges of climate change, the Council has partnered with Adelaide City Council and the other six Eastern Region Alliance Councils (Cities of Burnside, Prospect, Tea Tree Gully, Unley along with the Town of Walkerville and Campbelltown City Council) to develop a detailed Climate Change Adaptation Plan – ‘Resilient East’.

‘Resilient East’ will provide Councils with the tangible actions needed to address the local impacts of climate change, in order to ensure that the community, economy, assets, infrastructure and the natural environment of Adelaide’s eastern region are ready to adapt to future climate scenarios.

The ‘Resilient East’ project has been the subject of collaboration and input from a diverse range of organisations and is jointly funded through Federal, State, Local Government and the Adelaide and Mt Lofty Ranges Natural Resources Management Board.

“Resilient East is about exploring what we can do to make sure our businesses, communities and environments can respond positively to the challenges and opportunities of a changing climate.”



In the eastern region, climate models forecast substantial changes relating to rainfall intensity, extreme temperatures, water scarcity and fire risk, such as:

- the number of days over 40 degrees is projected to double by 2050, with heatwave frequency and duration also expected to increase;
- increased bushfire risks with an increase in the number of extreme fire risk days throughout the foothill areas;

- water conservation will increasingly become a priority, with average rainfall expected to decrease 7%;
- flood risk will increase, with the intensity of heavy rainfall increasing by 10% by 2050.

The last phase of the Resilient East project is nearing completion with the preparation of the final Climate Change Adaptation Plan, based on a range of regional and local adaptation 'pathways', with recommended actions to help the eastern region adapt, thrive and prosper into the future.

The Climate Change Adaptation Plan, affecting many aspects of the way Councils deliver projects and services, will be considered by the participating Councils in early 2016.

We have also seen the continued excessive hacking of street trees by SA Power Networks in the face of community opposition. In 2016, major threats to residents' quality of life include the State Government's devolving planning powers to regional bodies to silence public opposition to new developments. A related threat is Planning Minister John Rau's rezoning of our main roads to encourage three to ten storey flats.

Planning Policy Matters

2015 has been a busy year for planning and development, with a number of significant projects being pursued by the State Government.

These projects, including a review of the 30 Year Plan for Greater Adelaide, changes to Activity Centres policies and a major expansion of 'Urban Corridor' zones to allow for high density mixed use development along many metropolitan main roads, are occurring at the same time that Parliament is debating major changes to the legislation which governs planning and development matters.

The State Government has introduced significant changes to drive economic growth through urban development and investment.

The changes include relaxing development guidelines to allow a broader range of building forms and land uses in and around centres, along arterial road corridors and in areas identified for redevelopment. Key aspects of these emerging strategies and proposals are:

- 248,000 additional homes throughout the Greater Adelaide region by 2045;
- 80% of these homes built within the existing metropolitan area;
- taller buildings and a more mixed land use environment within 'Urban Corridor' locations;
- Payneham Road, Magill Road, The Parade, Fullarton Road and the 'Stepney Triangle' to be the focus of new 'Urban Corridor' zoning;

- reduced role of Local Government in development assessment and the regionalisation of policy formulation; and
- reduced public notification and appeal rights for a range of development proposals.

Maintaining a Tidy Environment

Street Sweeping Program

The Council's Street Sweeping Program is designed to manage the clean up of the Council's tree-lined streets, in a coordinated manner.

There are 10 main components to the Street Sweeping Program which aim to address the areas of highest need and respond to the seasonal activity of street trees, whilst maintaining the quality of our environment.

Residential Sweeping

Local roads are swept once every six weeks. This cycle maintains the ideal balance between the removal of accumulated leaf and road litter, aesthetics and the cost of delivery.

The residential sweeping program is conducted all year round and results in a total of over 260 kilometres of kerbing swept every six weeks.

Main Roads

Due to the high traffic volume along main arterial roads, these are swept all year round on a four weekly cycle.

High Pedestrian Generator Roads

The High Pedestrian Generator Roads component targets main roads which have high pedestrian traffic and therefore require the footpaths to receive greater attention, particularly during periods of high leaf drop.

Autumn Leaf

The dedicated Autumn Leaf component of the Program targets streets lined with Plane and Oak trees, with a focus on the western suburbs of the City. Debris on roads and footpaths is blown and swept on a fortnightly basis for an eight week period, typically between the months of May to June. A total of 128 kilometres of kerbing is swept during each Autumn Leaf cycle.

High Density Parking

The high density parking component targets streets which experience heavy leaf fall at certain times of year, coupled with high density parking. These areas are typically in Norwood and Kensington.

This program is carried out twice during the year. The Summer High Density Parking typically takes place for a period of 9 weeks, from December to February, with the roads swept on a three weekly cycle.

The Autumn High Density Parking takes place for a period of 16 weeks, from April to July and sees the roads swept on a fortnightly cycle.

Summer Sweep

Concentrated in the suburbs of Payneham, St Morris and Felixstow, the Summer Sweep focuses on addressing the bark and seed pods which drop from Eucalyptus and Queensland Box trees during the summer months. Typically running from December to February, over 250 kilometres of kerbing is swept on a three weekly cycle over an 18 week period.

White Cedar Berries

Held annually between September and November, the White Cedar Berries component is a vital part of the Program given the nuisance white cedar berries can cause. Depending on the season, affected streets can be swept fortnightly over an eight week period.

Acorns

This is a small targeted component which aims to address issues associated with the drop from Acorn trees during February/March each year. Identified streets are attended to weekly throughout the eight week program.

Car parks

Council-owned car parks are swept every three months, to remove any build-up of leaf litter and other materials.

Traffic Management Devices

Traffic management devices, such as roundabouts and traffic islands, are swept once a year at the end of Autumn, to ensure any build-up of material is removed from this important infrastructure.

Are you Prepared for the Heat this Summer?

Whilst many Australians have firsthand experience of the impact and effects of extreme temperatures, many remain unaware of the issues it can cause.

Indeed, many people would be surprised at recent findings from Macquarie University, that extreme heat has been responsible for over half of all listed natural hazard fatalities in Australia from 1900 to 2011.

Nationally, states and territories are responding to the challenge and examining how to better manage heatwave risks.

In South Australia, the State Emergency Service (SES) plays an important and unique role as Hazard Leader and Control Agency for extreme heat. It partners with a host of government and non-government organisations to improve understanding of risk, increase community resilience and preparedness and minimise impacts during heatwave events.

The SES is also responsible for issuing Extreme Heat warnings to the community.

Here are some simple things you can do to reduce the impact of extreme heat:

- Stay hydrated – drink two to three litres of water a day, even if you don't feel thirsty.
- Dress for summer – lightweight, light coloured clothing reflects heat and sunlight and helps your body maintain a normal temperature.

- Check on those at risk – visit at-risk individuals such as the sick and elderly and keep an eye on children. Watch for signs of heat-related illness.
- Minimise sun exposure – keep out of the sun as much as possible. If you must be in the sun, wear sunscreen, a shirt, hat and sunglasses.
- Prepare your home – service or replace your air conditioner before you need to use it. Curtains, awnings and blinds can also help to keep the home cool.
- Make use of air conditioning – if you do not have air conditioning, make use of public facilities such as shopping centres, libraries, cinemas or other air-conditioned buildings.
- Remember your pets – pets can be particularly vulnerable to the heat. Make sure they have shade and plenty of cool water to last the day.
- Seek medical advice if necessary – telephone Healthdirect Australia on 1800 022 222 or for immediate medical assistance, telephone 000.

With global warming causing rising temperatures, extreme heat events, resulting in summer heatwaves will become more common in Australia.
