Mayor's Message

Welcome to the August 2016 edition of Look East



It is hard to recall a busier first half of a year than the last six months, which concluded with the Federal Election on 2 July.

For the Council, most of this period was devoted to preparing the 2016-2017 Annual Business Plan & Budget, which aims to strike a balance between a low rate increase, whilst investing in community infrastructure and supporting local business.

A recent example of the Council's investment into its community infrastructure is the Payneham Oval Playground, an \$840,000 project which opened in August 2015 and provides a regional-level play space for the benefit of the local community.

This Council also continues to recognise the important role that Local Government can play in supporting the local economy, which often gets overlooked. Whilst it is true that Local Government does not have the same economic levers as other spheres of government, the Council's influence in creating a business-friendly environment is still worthy of attention. According to the South Australian Centre for Economic Studies (2013), "Councils individually and through regional collaboration have a role to play in economic development which is integral to achieving the core objectives of enhancing community development."

In order to support our local economy, the Council has kept next year's rate increase for commercial property at an (average) 0.60 per cent.

Support for Glynde's world-class food businesses, which commenced three years ago with the launch of the 'Food Secrets of Glynde' initiative, has continued, with the hugely successful 'Taste Glynde' event held at Robern Menz in May.

The rise of Glynde's profile as one of Adelaide's major food manufacturing precincts is now attracting food lovers from across the metropolitan area to participate in monthly bus tours.

Building on this success, the Council is also working closely with other local food manufacturers to develop Norwood Payneham & St Peters' reputation as a genuine 'food city'.

In keeping with its commitment to support and promote local creative industries, the Council recently approved a new lease for Brick+Mortar, situated behind the Norwood Town Hall, which is working with local creative and start-ups through the newly formed South Australian Co-working Association. The development of The Parade Masterplan, which began with an extensive community consultation process in late January, will result in the first major upgrade of the precinct in over 20 years.

Magill Road is also being supported through the development of a new logo and brand, with traders and property owners having had the opportunity to have a direct say in the design process.

The Kent Town Urban Design Framework will look at planning a more attractive, greener and safer public realm and also provide a strategic direction for the Council to ensure that future changes in this important gateway between our City and the Adelaide CBD, can be managed effectively.

What all of this work shows is that this Council is serious in its efforts to bring economic prosperity to our community, now and into the future.

On a personal note, I would like to congratulate the Council's Chief Executive Officer, Mario Barone on receiving a Public Service Medal within the 2016 Queen's Birthday Honours, as well as Bruno Cavallaro, Construction & Maintenance Team Member, who was awarded 'Trainee of the Year' by Group Training (SA) Inc.

Progressing the 'Food Secrets of Glynde' initiative

The Council's 'Food Secrets of Glynde' initiative brings to life the hidden flavours, experiences and stories of the unique, world-class food manufacturing area in Glynde. Through this initiative, the Council is recognising and showcasing Glynde and the key role it can play in driving increased food and wine exports and reinforcing South Australia's position as a premier food and wine destination.

Originally launched in August 2014, the 'Food Secrets of Glynde' initiative has progressed to include the release of a second edition of the publication, guided bus tours and a project to implement way-finding signage around the Precinct.

In May 2016, the Council proudly hosted '*Taste Glynde*', a free community event held at Robern Menz in association with the 2016 *Tasting Australia* festival.

This highly successful event attracted around 3,500 people to the Precinct to enjoy product samples, food, wine and be treated to live cooking demonstrations by renowned chefs, including celebrity couple, Carmine and Lauren. Adelaide-based chef and restauranteur, Salvatore Pepe, has recently been appointed as the new Ambassador for Glynde and is honoured to take on this role to promote the flavours of his Italian heritage which are produced and manufactured in Glynde.

In February 2016, the Council initiated the Glynde Bus Tours Program, where guests are taken to five businesses in Glynde and treated to samples and tastings, lunch and merchandise. Held once a month, the Bus Tours have proved to be a vastly popular addition to the '*Food Secrets of Glynde*' initiative and are fully booked for 2016. The Glynde Bus Tours program for 2017 will be released soon! The second edition of the 'Food Secrets of Glynde' publication was released in May, which features current information about many of the food manufacturers and producers in the Glynde Precinct, including delicious recipe ideas and a Glynde business directory and location map.

To further capitalise on the publication, way-finding signage has been installed around the Glynde Precinct to assist visitors to follow the trail and discover the many food secrets in the area!

Our City's Award Winning Urban Developments

The Council's 'Excellence in Urban Design Awards', seek to recognise and celebrate locally responsive developments and renovations which improve the quality of the City's built environment.

Held in April, the 2016 Urban Design Awards received a record total of 14 nominations for residential and commercial urban developments, which were nominated by members of the general community, as well as design industry professionals.

The Awards were judged by a panel of industry experts comprising Peter Dungey, architect and urban designer; David Brown of BB Architects; Peter Jensen of Jensen Planning & Design; and the Council's General Manager, Urban Planning & Environment, Carlos Buzzetti.

The Urban Design Awards also seek to promote community awareness of the City's built environment and acknowledge the significant contribution which architects and designers make to the liveability of this Council area.

Mayor Robert Bria summarised the Awards program as being recognisant of local designers and developers who have succeeded in creating new developments that enhance the existing built character of the City.

"As a community, we should all show a commitment to the future development of our City and promote excellence in design which encourages social, economic and cultural prosperity," he said. In addition to the Best Residential and Best Commercial Awards, in 2016 a new 'People's Choice Award' category allowed members of the community to have their say on the most creative and innovative nomination.

The awards were conferred at a special event held on 16 June at creative retail hub, Brick+Mortar.

A Vision for The Parade, Norwood

Developing The Parade Masterplan

The Parade Masterplan is a significant Council initiative which will recognise, manage and enhance the strong 'sense of place' of The Parade, Norwood and its distinctive cultural, social and economic importance to the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters.

The primary objective of The Parade Masterplan is to provide the design framework to deliver a high quality public realm which focuses on providing an attractive, accessible, sustainable, connected and safe pedestrian and cycling friendly environment.

The Masterplan will also identify public transport opportunities that support the needs of the increasing number of people who will live, work and visit The Parade in future.

In January 2016, the Council appointed Oxigen Landscape Architecture and its multi-disciplinary sub-consultancy team, to develop the Masterplan for The Parade, which encompasses the whole of The Parade, between Fullarton Road and Portrush Road. Earlier this year, consultation was undertaken with the community and key stakeholders to identify their vision for The Parade. Participants were invited to provide thoughts and ideas about what they love about The Parade, what changes they would make and how it could be improved.

Through various engagement opportunities, including a stall at the Santos Tour Down Under event held on The Parade in January 2016 and utilising an online engagement technology, the Council was able to capture the views and ideas of hundreds of people.

As part of the community and stakeholder consultation, the Council also undertook direct engagement with children and young people from six primary and secondary schools across the Council area. The intent of the consultation with school children was to capture the views and creativity of these major stakeholders and design the street to meet the needs of all users.

The feedback from the consultation is currently being reviewed and will be used to help inform the development of a range of draft concepts, which will be presented to the Council later in the year.

Beulah Road Bicycle Boulevard

One of the priority infrastructure actions arising from the Council's City-wide Cycling Plan is the development of a Bicycle Boulevard along Beulah Road, Norwood, between Portrush Road and Fullarton Road.

Beulah Road is the first Bicycle Boulevard to be progressed in the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters. This is a priority route used by cyclists and aligns with adjoining Councils priorities for cycling accessibility and State Government objectives for connectivity and safety for cyclists in the east.

The intent of this major project is to enhance Beulah Road as a safer and more attractive cycling route than along the parallel arterial roads of The Parade or Magill Road, whilst maintaining existing accessibility and car parking for motorists. Community consultation regarding the preferred Design Concept for the Bicycle Boulevard was undertaken in March 2016. During the one month consultation period, 117 submissions were received and of these, 74 submissions (63%) were generally in support of the plan and the preferred Design Concept. A further 13 (11%) did not express support or opposition but raised questions or suggested design modifications, whilst 30 submissions (26%) were not in support of the proposal.

The Final Design Concept, which was amended to address the comments and feedback which resulted from the community consultation, was endorsed by the Council at its 6 June meeting.

"The Council's Strategic Management Plan, *CityPlan 2030*, sets out objectives and strategies for creating a peoplefriendly, integrated and sustainable transport network which promotes the use of alternative transport to motor vehicles," said Mayor Bria.

"Implementing this significant Project sends a clear signal to our community that the Council is supportive of alternative forms of transport and committed to providing safe and accessible facilities for cyclists," he said.

The Council has allocated \$500,000 in its 2016-2017 Budget for the implementation of the Project and has applied for external funding from the State Government's Greenways and Bicycle Boulevard Fund.

New Laws for Cyclist Safety

In October 2015, new cycling laws were introduced by the State Government which allow cyclists to ride on footpaths, unless a sign is posted that specifically prohibits cyclists from doing so. The law changes also prescribe a minimum 'one metre rule' as a safe distance for motorists when overtaking cyclists on the road. Following the introduction of the new laws, Councils were given the option to prohibit the riding of bicycles on footpaths through the installation of traffic control devices, pavement markings and signage.

The City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters undertook investigations and observed that there has not been a marked increase in cycling on footpaths since the new laws came into effect and of the few cyclists who were observed cycling on footpaths, no safety issues have been identified.

The Council determined that it would not prohibit cycling on footpaths or change existing footpath infrastructure and resolved to undertake a 'business as usual' approach. The Council will continue to monitor and observe cyclist and pedestrian activity on footpaths.

The Council's 2016-2017 Budget is a future-focused and financially responsible budget, which is targeted at ensuring the Council's continuing and emerging priorities are appropriately resourced and funded.

Strategic Direction

The Council's Strategic Management Plan, *CityPlan 2030: Shaping Our Future*, was adopted in July 2008 and provides the overarching planning framework for all of the Council's decision-making.

CityPlan 2030 sets out the broad directions and objectives as to how the Council's overall aim of community Well-being will be achieved, using a unique Quadruple Bottom Line (QBL) Framework. Each year, the Council's Annual Business Plan & Budget is built upon the strategic outcomes outlined in *CityPlan 2030* and the Long-Term Financial Plan 2012-2022, with a focus on ensuring that the Council can maintain its existing services whilst appropriately funding new projects and initiatives.

The Council's financial sustainability is dependent on ensuring that, on average over time, the Council's income can cover the cost of its operational expenses.

Capital Works Program 2016-2017

The Council invests significant resources each year to ensure the high quality and standard of its infrastructure, including roads, footpaths, kerbs, buildings and recreation and open space assets. In 2016-2017, the Council's overall Capital Works Program budget of \$4,407,517 incorporates:

- Civil Infrastructure \$2,890,667
- Drainage Infrastructure \$500,000
- Buildings Infrastructure \$414,500
- Recreation & Open Space \$605,626

The Civil Infrastructure Capital Works Program involves upgrades and improvements to the City's streets, with works including reseals, footpath paving and kerbing.

2016 Hard Waste & Electronic Waste Collection

The Council's annual Hard Waste and Electronic Waste Collection Service for residential properties will take place from Monday 29 August to Friday 30 September 2016.


This service is offered as part of the Council's ongoing commitment to responsible waste management, promoting waste reduction and environmental sustainability. It is an opportunity for residents to dispose of unwanted items, free of charge, in an environmentally-friendly and convenient manner.

Residents are asked to place items for collection on the kerbside no earlier than 12 noon on Saturday and no later than 7.00am on Monday of the designated week for collection in your area, as shown on the map below. Items for disposal must be neatly stacked as close to the kerb as possible and must not obstruct the footpath. Electronic waste should be separated from general hard rubbish items. The electronic waste is collected and sent to a specialist recycling facility where it is disassembled and supplied to other processors for re-use.

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CityPlan 2030 Review

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New Clubrooms for Payneham Oval

The Council has been successful in its application to the Commonwealth Government's National Stronger Regions Fund (Round 3), for grant funding of \$499,250 to upgrade the clubrooms at Payneham Oval. The upgrade to the Payneham Oval clubrooms will be undertaken as part of Stage 2 of the redevelopment of the Payneham Oval Complex, following the Stage 1 completion of the new playground in August 2015.

The Commonwealth funding, which matches the Council's \$500,000 contribution contained in its 2016-2017 Annual Budget, will result in improved accessibility and amenities at the Oval.

The clubrooms upgrade will include installation of an access lift, upgrading toilets to make them accessible, new air conditioning, improved lighting and solar panels. Additional works will include the installation of netting behind the southern goals and landscaping.

"This is a great result for the Payneham Norwood Union Football Club and Payneham Cricket Club to see these facilities undergo a major refurbishment," said Mayor Bria. "Both Clubs have been an integral part of our community for more than a century and this investment in local sporting infrastructure means that supporters of the Clubs can enjoy high quality and accessible facilities in the future.

"The Council is grateful that its grant application was viewed in a positive light by the Commonwealth Government and looks forward to starting work on the upgrade in April 2017, subject to discussions with user groups and approvals," he said.

Syd Jones Reserve Concept Plan

In late 2016, the Council will commence the process of developing a Concept Plan for Syd Jones Reserve, located in Firle.

The Concept Plan will provide the Council with a new vision for Syd Jones Reserve, which will improve the presentation and deliver a Reserve that is better tailored to the needs of the local community. In May 2016, the Council resolved to demolish the building at the Reserve which was formerly occupied by the Eastern Suburbs State Emergency Services (SES) Unit, following their relocation to premises in Norwood. Given the age and relatively poor condition of the building, the Council resolved to return the site to open space, rather than invest a significant amount of money into restoring the building.

Along with the potential removal of other existing infrastructure which is no longer in operation (such as the tennis courts and some of the play equipment), this has presented the Council with a unique opportunity to reimagine Syd Jones Reserve as a valued community destination, as well as returning over 40% of the Reserve to public open space.

The ability to provide well designed and innovative open spaces contributes to the fabric of the Council area. The development of a Concept Plan will not only ensure an integrated and environmentally sustainable outcome for the Syd Jones Reserve but will also deliver social and cultural benefits for the community.

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River Torrens Linear Park Shared Use Path Project

In an effort to improve the efficiency and safety of the River Torrens Linear Park for all users, the Council has resolved to allocate the total amount of funding that it will receive through the Federal Government's 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 Roads to Recovery funding, to the construction of the River Torrens Linear Park Shared Use Path Project. Whilst the Council receives this funding from Roads to Recovery annually, the amount which will be received in 2016-2017 and 2017-2018, is almost three times the normal amount, providing the Council with the opportunity to think more strategically about how the funds are allocated.


Mindful of the redevelopment of Felixstow Reserve, which includes an upgrade to the section of the Linear Park that runs along the length of Felixstow Reserve, the Council identified an opportunity to upgrade the path network along the River Torrens Linear Park, from Felixstow Reserve to Battams Road, Joslin.

This Project will not only complement the redevelopment of Felixstow Reserve but will also result in approximately 50% of the River Torrens Linear Park Shared Use Path, within the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters being upgraded. As the first step in delivering this exciting project, the Council has commenced work on a Management Framework and Concept Plan, which will determine the most appropriate alignment for a wider path, as well as the integration of water management, existing vegetation, playgrounds, BBQ facilities, toilets, furniture, lighting and open spaces.

These documents will also provide the Council with the strategic direction for the long-term management of its existing open space assets along Linear Park.

Whilst the River Torrens Linear Park Management Framework and Concept Plan will outline an integrated longterm upgrade of the Linear Park from the river to the edge of the trail, the initial focus will be to deliver a new shared use path along the Linear Park to accommodate the increased frequency of use and improve the safety of pedestrians and cyclists.

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Resilient East Climate Change Adaptation Plan

Leading the way in preparing for the challenges of climate change, the Council has endorsed the draft Resilient East Regional Climate Change Adaptation Plan, which outlines climate change adaptation priorities and pathways for the eastern region of metropolitan Adelaide. The Project was commenced in 2014 in a collaborative effort between eight partnering Councils, namely the Cities of Norwood Payneham & St Peters, Adelaide, Burnside, Tea Tree Gully, Unley, Prospect, Campbelltown City Council and the Town of Walkerville. The Project is supported by the Department of Environment, Water and Natural Resources, South Australian Fire and Emergency Services Commission (SAFECOM) and the Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges Natural Resources Management Board.

The Resilient East Regional Climate Change Adaptation Plan aims to ensure a collaborative approach to climate change across Adelaide's eastern region, which aligns with the State Government's Climate Change Adaptation Framework (2012). The Plan provides the participating Councils with the tangible actions required to address the local impacts of climate change, in order to ensure that the community, economy, assets, infrastructure and the natural environment can respond positively to the challenges presented by a changing climate.

The draft Regional Climate Change Adaptation Plan provides a clearly defined framework and scope to implement the Resilient East Project. A copy of the Plan is available online at www.npsp.sa.gov.au

In the State Government's *30 Year Plan for Greater Adelaide,* Kent Town is recognised as a 'significant high density, mixed use, and regeneration opportunity''. To support this vision and complement the anticipated growth within Kent Town, the Council will be developing an Urban Design Framework for the Kent Town Precinct. Development of the development of the Kent Town Urban Design Framework will commence in August 2016.

Helping elderly residents to live well

In June 2016, the Council's Home Support Program underwent a Quality Review and was successful in being assessed as delivering a high quality service, enabling older residents to be supported to live well in our community.

The Quality Review process is completed every three years by the Commonwealth Government's Aged Care Quality Agency and assesses the Council's services in the areas of home and community care against the National Home Care Standards, consisting of three main standards and a combined total of 18 outcomes which need to be met. In addition to the review, auditors verified the self-assessment through interviews with staff, contractors, Volunteers and clients.




